Report from the Trust Chair, June Clifford



The celebration of 60 years of wonderful chamber music performed and composed in New Zealand provided a magnificent focus for 2010. We can truly reflect on a year which gave audiences an opportunity to enjoy outstanding performances, by musicians of renown and superb musicianship, alongside the 'brio' of young

emerging New Zealand and overseas artists, in a variety of genres. Time was also spent reminiscing on past endeavours and the rich heritage of stories of the many people who have contributed to the fabric of our history was captured in a fine volume "Staying In Tune" written by Jane Dawson. This was gifted to all subscribers at the final concert for the year, a Schubertiade, also a gift in appreciation of loyalty.

The success of the programming and choice of artists in 2010 is indisputable, and on behalf of the Trust Board I commend the musical understanding and entrepreneurial expertise of Euan Murdoch, CEO, and the staff at Chamber Music New Zealand. The financial results for the year are an endorsement of this and of other interesting and rewarding innovations.

The generosity of Piera McArthur, artist, through her paintings of the Borodin Quartet, proved a very exciting and unusual Fund Raising vehicle. All funds received as well as all donations for the year were transferred to the CMNZ Foundation. We continue to look at various ways of explaining to the many committed chamber music audience members the need for a fund which ensures the future of the genre. Michael Houstoun, our Advocate, generously spoke and played to groups in Christchurch and Hawke's Bay to raise awareness of the ease of contributing through bequests and gifts to the Encore programme.

During 2010 Creative New Zealand, to whom we continue to be greatly indebted for their willingness to invest in us, conducted a Review of the Recurrently Funded Organisations in their care. This resulted in a new structure and designations, and we were delighted to be named as an Arts Leadership Organisation for chamber music. The process involved both Board and Staff, and the research and final application was prepared and presented by Euan Murdoch, CEO, and Richard Hardie, Operations Manager. Whilst we waited for the all important decision the Board and CEO took time to revise and rewrite the Strategic Plan for the organisation. This proved a valuable exercise, with the resultant document near to completion at the year's end, ready for sign off and implementation in 2011 and the future.

The Board were also pleased to encourage by way of financial help artists and some presenters in the Regional Touring network. This involvement is part of the big picture which Chamber Music New Zealand continues to support. These projects and the Education activities, the NZ Community Trust Chamber Music Contest and *Ensembles in Schools*, are of significant value in outreach and long term enrichment. These, and our *Kaleidoscopes* tours, are often underpinned by funding from generous benefactors who recognize the importance of music in the lives of all New Zealanders. Many others give prodigiously of their time and effort. In 2010 Joan Gaines, Chair of New Plymouth Branch Committee, who has given unstintingly in Taranaki over many years, was accorded Life Membership of CMNZ in recognition of her wonderful service.

It has been a privilege to serve as Chair of the Trust Board of Chamber Music New Zealand. I have been fortunate to lead a group of dedicated and talented Board members, an outstanding CEO and supportive staff, all of whom have a vision for the future, and the will to grow love, understanding and enjoyment of chamber music in all its guises by all New Zealanders.

Report from the CEO, Euan Murdoch

2010 began with the Borodin Quartet performing to a combined audience of 5000 and concluded with a *Schubertiade* featuring Kiwis Michael Houstoun, the New Zealand String Quartet and bassist Michael Steer. The familiarity and effervescence of the Trout Quintet was a fitting way to end the season and it brought universal delight to audiences. These 60th birthday concerts were presented as a gift to our subscribers.

One of the features of this season was that six of the ensembles toured to all centres. This was a deliberate choice and meant that audiences from Invercargill to Auckland enjoyed exactly the same programmes and had access to the same artists.

It is the rich combination of artists that contributes to our unique cultural landscape. The Song Company from Sydney, the Doric String Quartet with Piers Lane from the UK, young Czech virtuoso Josef Špaček with Michael Houstoun and the NZTrio toured on our main series for the first time.

One project that caught the imagination of our audiences was the Wallfisch Band who presented a themed programme entitled *Venetian Carnival*. Combining international experts with our own rising stars in a period instrument ensemble, the project demonstrated our vital role as a development agency and set a blueprint for future initiatives.

National ensembles toured on the regional concert network, from Kerikeri in the north to Gore in the south, giving artists the vital

opportunity to perform night after night. It also provided access for local audiences to enjoy high-quality concerts in their own community.

This winner of this year's NZCT Chamber Music Contest was the Genzmer Trio from Christchurch. The finalists' stellar performances can all be viewed on YouTube. There were two more *Ensembles in Schools* projects in Whanganui and Nelson, one featuring Saxcess and the other the Song Company. Julian Raphael continues to facilitate these projects for us and has built an impressive reputation for the quality and impact of this work in regional centres.

Given the increased levels of activity in our diamond anniversary year, it is pleasing that we achieved a \$44k surplus and transferred a further \$80k to our Foundation, made up of all individual giving. We thank the ongoing generosity of our funders, donors and sponsors.

Special acknowledgement must go to our Chair June Clifford who has worked tirelessly for us over five decades. It was wonderful for her to be made a Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit in the New Year's Honours List. Thanks also to our trustees, volunteers and staff throughout the country for their expertise and support.

Turning sixty has encouraged us to reflect on the past, celebrate the present and plan for the future.

Education Activities

NZCT Chamber Music Contest

The 45th anniversary of the Chamber Music Contest featured over 2,000 young musicians in over 500 groups, playing in 15 different District Contests from Whangarei to Invercargill. Twelve Semi-Finalists were selected to perform in Wellington on 30 July with six groups then being selected to perform at the National Final the following night.

National Final

Highlights: the winning performance by Christchurch's Genzmer Trio, comprising of Salina Fisher (piano), Todd Gibson-Cornish (bassoon) and Hugh Roberts (flute), who played Harald Genzmer's *Trio for Flute, Bassoon and Piano*; Finn Butler's winning composition, *Mr Gengerella*; the performance of saxophone ensemble Swtch, who won the KBB Music Award; videos of all the finalists which were available on Radio New Zealand's website and on YouTube following the performances.

Contest Coaching

Coaching workshops provide a fantastic opportunity for groups entered in the Contest to gain access to extra professional tutoring. In 2010, generous support from ABRSM enabled CMNZ to send professional musicians to 13 centres to coach a total of 47 groups. Coaches included Sally Tibbles, Gretchen La Roche, Stephen Larsen, Peter Garrity and Robert Ibell. Some of the groups were coached in open workshop situations at their schools, which enabled other students entered in the Contest as well as other music students to also gain something from the experience.

Masterclasses and workshops

A number of masterclasses and workshops were run by artists touring for CMNZ's *Kaleidoscopes* 2010 Season, including a masterclass given by the Song Company in Wellington, and sessions given by Piers Lane and the Doric String Quartet at the Pettman / ROSL ARTS International Chamber Music Scholarship.

Ensembles in Schools

In 2010, *Ensembles in Schools* ran in Whanganui and Nelson. In Whanganui, the project wrapped up in June with a massed performance in the Whanganui Memorial Hall of students and teachers from Whanganui Intermediate and Durie Hill School. Working with CMNZ's education facilitators, Julian Raphael and Jennifer Moss, and resident ensemble Saxcess, the students treated over 400 parents and friends in the audience to a rousing celebration of youth and music. The performance marked the culmination of a term-long project that saw Julian and Jennifer undertaking weekly classroom sessions at the two schools with the emphasis clearly placed on learning music in a fun and stimulating environment. In October, *Ensembles in Schools* went to Nelson, the first time in the South Island since the programme's inception in 2008. After their CMNZ tour, the Song Company joined Julian Raphael for an inspiring week of music at Victory Primary School.

Radio New Zealand

We continue to value our relationship with Radio New Zealand, who provide a crucial link to listeners nationwide who might not be able to get to our concerts, would like to hear the alternative programme presented on a tour, are interested in learning more about the performers through interviews, or would simply like to hear more from artists they enjoyed.

Many of our artists in both the main season and regional tours were interviewed by Eva Radich on Upbeat! either prior to, or during, a tour. These interviews were then available to listen to as a podcast for the following month on Radio New Zealand's website.

In 2010, concerts by the Borodin Quartet, NZTrio, Josef Spacek and Michael Houstoun, Richard Mapp and Emma Sayers, the Wallfisch Band, Piers Lane and the Doric String Quartet, the Song Company, and the New Zealand String Quartet with Michael Houstoun and Michael Steer (*Schubertiade*) were broadcast live or recorded for later broadcast. In most cases, RNZ recorded two programmes from each artist or ensemble. They also recorded the National Final of the NZCT Chamber Music Contest, and included a video link of the performances on their website.

In Concert



New Zealand Chamber Soloists

Genre: piano trio | 3 regional concerts | February/June

Highlights: spontaneous music-making and excellent communication; a programme of Russian pieces alongside an accessible work by young New Zealander Jonathan Crehan.

The Borodin Quartet

Genre: string quartet | 10 main season concerts | March

Highlights: kicking off our 60th anniversary year with such an internationally revered ensemble, beginning with a performance in Wellington as part of the New Zealand International Arts Festival; an “arresting performance from [a] superb quartet” (Stephen Fisher, *Manawatu Standard*); “consummate artistry” (Andrew Buchanan-Smart, *Waikato Times*); sell-out crowds around the country.

Richard Mapp and Emma Sayers

Genre: piano duo | 5 regional concerts | April

Highlights: hearing these masterly recitals with dexterous fingerwork given by two such experienced musicians; a new CMNZ commission by Kenneth Young, which was one of the highlights of the programme.

NZTrio

Genre: piano trio | 10 main season concerts including the Southland Festival of the Arts | April/May

Highlights: the first main season tour for the NZTrio; a new CMNZ commission by New Zealand-born composer Judy Bailey. *The Taranaki Daily News*' Anne Bovett admitted to trepidation when faced with contemporary works, but admitted that she was pleasantly surprised by the approachable works, full of “energy and emotion, haunting lyricism and dramatic effects” while Michael Houston commented that he was riveted by the performance from beginning to end.

The Wallfisch Band

Genre: early music ensemble | 4 main season concerts | May

Highlights: an innovative and unique undertaking for CMNZ, combining our development function with concerts for the first time; the week-long residency at Auckland University; Elizabeth Wallfisch's engaging communication style.

Nikau

Genre: flute, oboe, cello | 1 regional concert | May

Highlights: the trio's varied programme of lesser-known works, including Edwin Carr's *Petit Concert*.

Josef Špaček and Michael Houston

Genre: violin and piano | 10 main season and 5 regional concerts, including a performance at the Nelson Winter Music Festival | June

Highlights: hearing this young violin virtuoso, who was the winner of the 2009 Michael Hill International Violin Competition; Michael Houston's consummate musicianship. *The Dominion Post*'s John Button called Špaček “a player of great musical maturity” while the *New Zealand Herald*'s William Dart noted that, “We were transfixed from [his] very first phrase.”

Wellington Guitar Duo

Genre: guitar duo | 6 regional concerts | June

Highlights: superlative responses to programming, performance, and presentation, with audiences being impressed by their audience rapport and varied range of styles.

Goeknil Meryem Biner and Tom McGrath

Genre: soprano and piano | 1 regional concert | June

Highlights: an interesting programme titled ‘Turn of the Century’, featuring works by Berg, Wolf, Scriabin, Debussy and Ravel.



Niels Bijl and Diedre Irons

Genre: saxophone and piano | 3 regional concerts | July

Highlights: introducing a unique type of chamber music to regional societies; a work by New Zealander Michael Jamieson; hearing pianist Diedre Irons who is always popular with audiences and was described by Dutch saxophonist Niels Bijl as his “accompanist soulmate”.

Cook Strait Trio

Genre: piano trio | 7 regional concerts | August

Highlights: hearing this dynamic young ensemble, described by one society as “great ambassadors for New Zealand”; despite a change of cellist shortly before the tour commenced, the group performed with impressive cohesiveness, with *Middle C*'s Rosemary Collier commenting on their “distinguished, finely crafted performances”.

Doric String Quartet and Piers Lane

Genre: string quartet and piano | 10 main season concerts
September

Highlights: hearing this emerging ensemble, who were rated by *Gramophone* magazine as one of the top five quartets in the world, play some of the giants of the Romantic repertoire with Piers Lane. The *Waikato Times*'s Andrew Buchanan-Smart called their performance “a tour de force from beginning to end”. Directly after the tour, the musicians were in residence at the Pettman / ROSL ARTS International Chamber Music Scholarship.

Jenny Wollerman and Richard Mapp

Genre: soprano and piano | 1 regional concert | September

Highlights: exploring the themes of love, joy, tragedy, and heartbreak in favourite Schubert lieder and French songs by Debussy, Poulenc and Fauré with two of New Zealand's most experienced artists.



Aroha String Quartet

Genre: string quartet | 4 regional concerts | September/October

Highlights: hearing Gillian Whitehead's *Moon, Tides and Shoreline*, which was commissioned by CMNZ in 1989; being able to witness the group develop and mature – “rarely have I heard a string quartet produce such breathtakingly gorgeous, mellow, velvety sound”, commented *MusicWeb International*'s Paul Serotsky.

Elios

Genre: string quartet and flute | 4 regional concerts
September/November/December

Highlights: a varied and delightful programme for string quartet and guest flutist Karen Batten which included Boccherini, Turina, and Ginastera. *Middle C*'s Lindis Taylor commented on their “impressive ensemble feeling in a very wide variety of musical styles”.

The Song Company

Genre: vocal ensemble | 10 main season concerts | October

Highlights: the performance of two themed programmes, ‘The Seasons’ and ‘Sweet Dreams’; a new CMNZ commission by New Zealand composer Jack Body, which was extremely well received. During their tour, the group gave a masterclass at Queen Margaret College in Wellington, and worked with children in Nelson as part of our *Ensembles in Schools* programme.

Schubertiade

Genre: string quartet, piano, bass
10 main season | October/November

Highlights: celebrating our 60th anniversary in style with the New Zealand String Quartet, Michael Houston and Michael Steer in a themed programme of favourite Schubert works; presenting the concerts as gifts to our subscribers; hearing the famous ‘Trout’ Quintet and seeing the delighted reactions of audiences. *The Nelson Mail*'s Margot Hannigan called the performances “totally engrossing”.

A total of \$80,439 (2009: \$176,411) was paid to the CMNZ Foundation in 2010, made up of Individual Giving.

Income from Other Trusts

CMNZ manages two Trust Funds bequeathed for specific purposes.

- During the year CMNZ received \$8,587 (2009: \$11,791) from Trevkel Music Trust. These funds were allocated towards the costs of a residency at the School of Music, University of Auckland and development for emerging professional string players. The project will give young New Zealand musicians access to some of the finest early music specialists in the world in accordance with the terms of the Trust.
- Marie Vandewart Music Trust \$538 (2009: \$766) These funds were allocated to the recipient of the Marie Vandewart Memorial Award, Marion Stronach, for her outstanding contribution to the Chamber Music Contest in accordance with the terms of the Trust.

These balances are not included in the results of CMNZ.

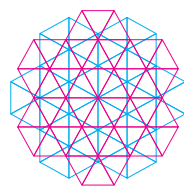
